Small Group Discussion Guide

(1 Tim. 2:8 - 14)

Open your group with a time of sharing and prayer. Ask God to give you insight into a somewhat difficult topic of study in today's lesson.

- In 1 Timothy, Paul gives Timothy specific instructions on how people ought to conduct themselves in God's household, the church. (1 Tim. 3:15) In what ways is the church like a household or family? How does a household's structure (line of authority, order, discipline, love, teamwork, mutual respect) fit in the church? What happens to a church when these are absent?
- II. Read <u>1 Tim. 2:8</u>. In verse one Paul already introduced the topic of prayer in the church. How are <u>men</u> to pray? What does he mean by lifting hands in prayer? Why the reference to anger and disputing? What effect do these have on our prayers? (Note Ps. 66:18 19, 1 Pet. 3:7) What things do men tend to dispute over in churches? How are disputes in the church to be settled? (Note 1 Cor. 6:1 6)
- III. Now read $\underline{1 \text{ Tim. } 2:9-10}$. Paul is addressing an issue with the <u>women</u> of Ephesus. What is it? Why could this have been a problem in the church? What solution does he suggest? Is this an issue for us today? Explain.
- IV. The next paragraph is somewhat controversial and not easily understood. Read <u>1 Tim. 2:11 14</u> carefully. Start by considering the context of the church at Ephesus. Again Paul is addressing <u>an issue there</u>. What do you surmise the

problem was? The word "woman" is the same word for wife/wives in Greek. How does this focus the problem if we use this translation? Is there an authority structure in the church (like there is in a household/ home)? Explain.

Why does Paul point back to the creation order to help solve this issue? (Apparently the Corinthian church has a similar issue. Note <u>1 Cor. 11:2 – 16</u>. Head coverings isn't exactly our problem today but tension between the sexes and leadership roles still is.)

Back to 1 Timothy, how is childbearing in verse 15 possibly a reference back to the curse of sin in <u>Genesis 3:16</u>? What tension exists between the wife's' desires and the husbands leadership as a result of the fall? What emphasis for women does Paul suggest back in <u>1 Timothy 2:15</u>? Does their context then fit our context now, and is male/female – husband/wife roles still a problem for us today? Any suggestions?
