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### Small Group Discussion Guide

Open your group with a time of sharing and prayer. Ask God to sharpen your minds as we study his truth and look for application in our personal lives.

We have come to the part of God's Story, the Bible, called the Kingdom years of Israel. We've seen the rule of Saul, David and Solomon over the united 12 tribes of Israel. Now a division occurs and things become much more dire and dramatic.

- Read <u>1 Kings 11:1-8</u>. Division in the kingdom occurs as a result of Solomon's sin. Where did he go wrong? David, before him, repented of his sins. Do we see any evidence of repentance in Solomon's case? What must true repentance always involve? Note <u>Matthew 3:7-8</u>.
- II. Read <u>1 Kings 11:9-13</u>. What consequences does God enact because of Solomon's lack of repentance? Note also <u>1 Kings 11:14,23,26</u>. The wages of sin is death (*Romans 6:23*). What does this mean for us as Christians today? Note <u>1 John 1:5-9</u>.
- III. Read <u>1 Kings 11:42 12:11</u>. Rehoboam succeeds his father, Solomon, as king. What is his first test as king and how is he advised to deal with it? Are economies still a major concern for people under governors today? How important are taxes and economies to the American people? As Christians, what issues would you suggest are more important? Be specific.
- IV. Now read <u>1 Kings 12:12-19</u>. What results from Rehoboam's ruling? Why did this actually occur according to verse 15 and <u>1 Kings 11:29-33</u>? What do you see God doing in all this? Could he do something similar to us as a nation to-day? Why might he allow a nation (or even a church) to split up?

Think carefully about life lessons we can learn from Solomon's sins. Ask God to guard your heart against idolatry and its impact on those around us.



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
