Friday, February 9: Read Genesis 22, Mark 1

When God asks too much is the theme of this chapter. Sacrifice is an important concept in the Bible. Abraham, though he didn't understand what God was doing, was still willing to entrust to him the life of his "son of promise". God honored his faith and obedience and eventually sacrificed his only son, the ultimate Son of Promise, on Mount Moriah in Jerusalem. Verse 14 from two thousand years B.C. echoed forth at Calvary, "On the mountain of the Lord it will be provided". The Sacrificial Lamb acted as our substitute and paid for our sins with his own death.

Has God given you an assignment that seems like it is just too much? Can you set aside doubt, anxiety and the inability to understand what he is doing and simply trust him? Like Abraham, follow his leading and watch to see how he provides for you. Make *Romans 12:1-2* a model verse for your life and circumstances -- his will for you will be good, pleasing and perfect. He promises. Your own experience just might affirm Abraham's ancient credo, "On the mountain of the Lord it will be provided".

 - 1. How does this apply to me?
 - 2. Are there any temptations to avoid, sins to confess, commands to obey or promises to claim?
 - 3. What insight do I gain on God, myself, others, or life?
- Ask God to show you any specific action you need to take as you read.

Monday, February 5 Read Genesis 1

Between now and Easter we will pick up on a Bible reading plan developed by Deron Spoo called <u>The Good Book -- 40 Chapters That Reveal the Bible's Biggest Ideas!</u> Our reading will be a general survey of Old and New Testament themes, one chapter a day for 8 weeks. Each week we will have a general theme with five daily chapters to read in keeping with the main concept for that week.

The first theme for this week is "In the Beginning". Genesis chapter one suggests a novel idea for all of us -- of all his creation, humans stand out as unique, special, and most valuable. They alone are made in God's image and are put in charge of the rest of God's majestic creation. Like God, we have a spirit, moral awareness, free will and the capacity for relationships. And, like God, we can decide and do things that affect reality and direct our destiny. Thank God today for making you so valuable and unique. Ask him to use you to make a difference in the lives of those around you.

Tuesday, February 6: Read <u>Genesis 3</u>

Though God made the universe good and perfect, something happened. Genesis 3 records the account When Everything Broke -- Including You. The origin of evil starts with the devil, who is called crafty. He tempts Eve to doubt God and act contrary to God's instructions. Both Eve and Adam comply. To be honest, we have as well! Because of sin, there's something wrong with everything. Notice not everything is wrong. Just everything has been tainted by man's sinful disobedience to God. As a result of sin, Adam and Eve are afraid and try to hide from God. But God searches them out and confronts the crisis they've created.

What are you afraid of? And what tactic have you invented to avoid (hide from) God? <u>1 John 1:5-9</u> might be excellent instructions for what you need to do next.

Wednesday February 7: Read <u>Genesis 6</u>

Deron Spoo's topic for Genesis 6 is "Staying Afloat in Troubled Times". God grieved over the rampant wickedness of humanity, but he looked with favor on Noah and his family. Noah is described as righteous before God and blameless among men. He walked with God in a dark time. Verse 22 states that Noah did everything that God commanded him. Even so, his obedience led to years of struggle with his family's eventual escape from death and destruction.

Because of Jesus, God looks upon you with favor. He sees you as righteous and blameless in Christ. He can keep you afloat in troubled times and deliver you from ultimate death and destruction. Ask him for help today and be ready to do everything he commands you.

Thursday, February 8: Read Genesis 12

Today's theme is "Faith isn't safe". The Mount Rushmore of the Bible would likely include the four faces of Abraham, Moses, David and Jesus. To understand the Bible, we need to understand the lives of these four men. Abraham is often called the Father of our faith. He is a model of ultimate trust in God, willing to leave everything and go whenever God calls him to do something. Following God is not necessarily comfortable. It's a challenge. It's a daily adventure of faith, not always knowing where God is leading us. *Hebrews 11:8-10* reminds us of this. Memorize *Hebrews 11:6* and ask God to help you to be more attentive and faithful to his daily leading in your life. Remember, he has a reward for all who earnestly seek him.
