 1. *How does this apply to me?*
 2. *Are there any temptations to avoid, sins to confess, commands to obey or promises to claim?*
 3. *What insight do I gain on God, myself, others, or life?*
- *Ask God to show you any specific action you need to take as you read.*

Monday, March 12 Read [Luke 8](#)

Author Devon Spoo's message for the week is Jesus Won't Leave Us As We Are. He begins the week with Luke chapter 8 highlighting the question Is Jesus Strong Enough? In this chapter, Luke records four miracles that demonstrate Jesus' divine power over nature, the demonic realm, sickness and even death. Unlike other world religious leaders, Jesus is more than a moral man with a new religious ideal. He is God among men, creating a whole new era of people who are set free from sin, death and the power of the devil. And he has shown himself strong enough to bear the burdens of your life today. Ask him specifically to do so. ([1 Peter 5:7](#))

Friday, March 16: Read [Mark 7, Matthew 28](#)

Beating Death. That's the author's caption for Matthew 28. Here, Matthew describes Jesus' resurrection as a real, historic event. Four different groups witness it. The Angels, first at the tomb, declared it empty, "He has risen, just as he said. He is not here." The Women arrive, encounter the angels and turn to discover Jesus alive! From there, they are sent to "preach" the resurrection, starting with Jesus' disciples in hiding. The guards were witnesses to Easter. They had to be paid off to keep silent. Did they remain silent or eventually confess the truth, and even embrace Christ as Savior? Heaven will tell. Finally, the disciples witnessed Jesus' victory of sin, death and the power of the devil. Their lives, forever altered, had been re-destined to serve the risen Savior and declare his truth to a world in need of the life only God can offer. Their commission then is ours today as modern day disciples. And Jesus' promise to them then is ours today as well, "Surely I will be with you always to the end of the age".

Easter is just two weeks away. Who do you know that needs assurance of victory, forgiveness of sins and the promise of eternal life? Why not join those ancient witnesses and reach out with the good news -- death has received a fatal blow!! Jesus is alive! And in Christ, we too will live!

Tuesday, March 13: Read [John 3](#)

The Original Come-to-Jesus Meeting is found in this chapter of John's gospel. John records numerous conversations Jesus had with individuals in his book, but this one models the basic need we all possess at birth -- the need to be born again, to have a new spiritual beginning regardless of who we are or how we've lived our lives. Jesus reveals to Nicodemus that God's dominant attitude toward the world is love--genuine concern for the salvation of all. He is not willing that any should perish but that all should come to repentance.

John does not tell us what happened to Nicodemus after his conversation with Jesus. But he does include Nicodemus in his burial account in chapter 19 hinting to his conversion to Christianity. Do you need a spiritual rebirth? It's yours for the asking if you'll simply entrust your life into Jesus' care.

Wednesday March 14: Read [Luke 15](#)

The author's theme for Luke 15 is God is Looking For What He Loves. Luke records three parables of Jesus that serve as word pictures of God's tender concern for lost people. In the first parable, a sheep, ignorant of danger, wanders off. The alarmed shepherd come to his rescue and rejoins him to the flock. The second tells of an accidental loss of money and the intensive search to get it back. The final, and most famous, story illustrates an intentional loss of the son who leaves home and squanders his father's wealth. The father's vigilance captures sight of his homebound son and heartily welcomes him home again, restoring the broken relationship. God looks for what he loves! He loves people and is looking to restore everyone who will turn to him.

Do you know somebody who's lost? God wants to bring 'em in. Why not ask him to use you to point the way back home.

Thursday, March 15: Read [Mark 15](#)

Someone once remarked Every Scar Tells a Story. That's certainly true of Jesus and his crucifixion. Mark's account of Jesus' death could be organized in three parts -- Above the cross (verse 33), Upon the cross (verses 34-38) and At the foot of the cross (verse 39). Above the cross the sky went black, even though it was midday. Creation is reacting to Jesus' innocent suffering. Upon the cross Jesus cries out, "My God, why have you forsaken me?" Jesus is literally fulfilling [2 Corinthians 5:21](#) in full view of all. He is taking upon himself the sins of the world from all ages, past, present and future. And, at the foot of the cross, a soldier who had maimed and scarred him, makes the ultimate declaration of faith -- "Surely this man was the Son of God." Can you join him in that confession? And, do you better understand the gospel, the ultimate love story of God told from Calvary's cross so long ago? Have his scars since healed? I think not! "See my hands, my feet, my side." Every scar tells the story once again.
