Monday, March 19 Read <u>Acts 1</u>

Our theme for this week is <u>Following Jesus</u>. Acts one helps us to understand <u>Where Jesus Is Now</u>. He has risen and interacts with his disciples over the kingdom work before them. Then, after 40 days, he is taken up out of their sight. Where? To the very presence of God, where he sits down to rule. He's in a real place, as a real, live person! Heaven, God's abode, receives Jesus in glorified human form. And it will receive us someday as well. The angels remind his followers that he will return someday, just as Jesus had told them. We are to remain faithful and watchful until that time arrives.

Tuesday, March 20: Read <u>Acts 2</u>

The author's title for Acts 2 is <u>Happy Birthday to Us</u>. Jesus has promised his disciples that in his absence the Spirit would come to carry on his work through them. Pentecost is the day he arrives, it's the birthday of Jesus' church on earth. As a present, God blows into them his Spirit life and his power for service. They were all enabled to speak new languages that communicated the gospel to the broad group of foreign Jews worshiping in Jerusalem during the Pentecost holiday. Peter explains to them the significance of this happening and several thousand convert to Christ on the spot. The newborn church begins to grow and expand all the way up to our day and age. We, like them, are devoted to the same principles of the disciples' doctrines, fellow-ship, worship and service.

Wednesday March 21: Read <u>Acts 9</u>

Saul of Tarsus discovered big time what can happen <u>When Jesus Interrupts Your Life</u>. Everything changes. For the better for sure, but not necessarily for the easier way. All new challenges awaited this persecutor-turned-pastor. Jesus audibly calls Saul to serve in his cause. Then he calls a disciple named Ananias to go and pray for Paul's conversion. At once, Saul goes to the synagogue and calls out for Jews to accept Jesus as Savior. And, at once, he is not well received as the tables turn on him and he now become the persecuted. And so Acts records the start of one of its prime apostles, known for the Greek translation of his name, Paul.

Does Jesus have permission to interrupt your life and plans? And, if he should call you to something specific, would you follow, regardless of what changes might occur?

Thursday, March 22: Read <u>Acts 10</u>

<u>God Loves the People You Can't Stand</u>. The Jews in Jesus' time were God's "chosen people". Any other people groups were lumped together as "Gentiles", the people God didn't choose. And in some cases, it was easy to suspect why they weren't chosen. However, God originally chose Israel to be the people he would reach out through to ultimately encompass all peoples. They failed to get that part straight. Enter the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, and the early Christian Jews began to cross cultural boundaries and witness to "unclean" Gentiles -- Samaritans, Greeks and Romans. And a church is formed out of what was once enemies from two different camps.

Is there a group of people you dislike? Don't be fooled into thinking that God joins in your sentiment. He loves them as much as he loves you. And as part of his people, he wants to use you to pray for and reach out to even your enemies. Like the early church, you'll need the Holy Spirit's help. But it can be done.
