Friday, March 30: Read <u>Mark 15:42-47; Matthew 27:57-66</u>

Jesus is dead. Joseph of Arimethea secures permission from Pilate to bury Jesus' body in his own tomb. Again, Mary Magdalene is singled out as one of the several faithful Galilean women who followed Jesus from the cross to the garden tomb. Matthew records the account of Roman guards being assigned to the gave in order to squelch any attempt of the disciples to steal the body and fabricate a resurrection tale. Sunset Friday marks the beginning of the Jewish Sabbath. Jesus' body is accommodated in the grave and those few brave followers scatter in order not to be found unclean on the passover Sabbath. Neither they, nor the Roman guards suspect all that God is about to accomplish there in just a few short days. Easter, like the rising eastern sun, lies just over the horizon!

 - 2. Are there any temptations to avoid, sins to confess, commands to obey or promises to claim?
 - 3. What insight do I gain on God, myself, others, or life?
- Ask God to show you any specific action you need to take as you read.

Monday, March 26 Read Isaiah 53, Psalm 22

We will break with the <u>40 Chapters That Reveal the Bible's Biggest Ideas</u> in order to focus on the passion of Christ during Holy Week. Two old testament prophecies speak volumes of the suffering of Messiah on behalf of the world. Jesus quotes Psalm 22:1 as one of his seven last words from the cross. The word imagery of this Psalm is quite impressive as the Psalmist depicts a crucifixion yet to take place some 1000 years on the future.

Isaiah 53 is commonly called the Suffering Servant Passage. This chapter unveils Jesus growing up, his rejection by Israel, his vicarious suffering and death on our behalf, his resurrection and his final glorification. What a passage! What a savior!

Tuesday, March 27: Read <u>Mark 14:26-51, Matthew 26:30-56.</u>

Both Mark and Matthew record the mental anguish of Christ in the garden of Gethsemane. His soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. Jesus' only remedy was prayer! He knew what lay ahead; he knew of the betrayer's kiss; he knew of the disciples' retreat and the torture that waited him at the hands of the Romans. So he prayer to his Father for strength and endurance. Then, like a lamb to the slaughter, he remained silent, taking the blame of the world's sins upon himself.

Wednesday March 28: Read John 18:28-19:15

Truth on trial! Jesus undergoes a series of trials all of which, according to Old Testament law, were illegal. Nonetheless, the religious leaders are determined to convict and execute him before any kind of uprising can occur. And so they push the Roman procurator and the governor to have him convicted of treason and executed. Under oath, Jesus admits his identity and, in their minds, seals his destiny to the cross, just as God had determined it should be from before the beginning of time.

<u>Thursday</u>, March 29: Read <u>Mark 15:16-41, Matthew 27:27-56</u>

Jesus' ascension up Calvary's hill, and then up upon the cross, fulfills his previous statement from "If I would be lifted up I will draw all men unto me". All four gospels give the sordid account of Jesus' vicarious suffering and death. Each selects details of his words spoken and his interaction with his executioners and the onlookers. Matthew and Mark note the presence of several women along with Jesus' mother at the foot of the cross. Most notable among them is Mary Magdalene, who would be the first witness of his resurrection Easter Sunday morning.
