## Friday, Aug. 18: Read Psalms 108-109, Luke 5

Psalm 108 is a love song to God. David rejoices the return of God to help him make this Promise Land his home. What gladness there is in the heart of one who knows God loves him. However, Psalm 109 speaks of difficult time because he yokes himself to God. He holds to fasting because of the oppression he experiences. He does not turn back in devotion to God. He affirms that God "stands at the right hand of the needy, to save their lives from those who would condemn them."

Luke records Jesus calling the disciples to follow him. He said to Simon, "Don't be afraid; from now on you will fish for people." Jesus demonstrates His authority over creation and the spiritual world. In doing so He assures Peter of His promise. However, this "friend of sinner," as Jesus is called, has much to teach Peter and the others in regards to being a leader. Peter and the others only need to have read the Psalms to realize following Jesus will not alway be sunshine and roses. They will, however, become fishers of men.

## Weekly Readings

Monday, Aug. 14: Read <u>Psalm 100-101, Luke 1</u>

Psalm 100 lifts our spirits and brings a song to our hearts. Psalm 101 causes us to step back and ask "where is the love?" God is both righteous and his loves endures forever. Thanks be to God that he has <u>reconciled</u> us in Christ Jesus (<u>Romans 5:10</u>).

Luke the physician is careful to record, as any good doctor, the exact details of all he has been told. We would be wise to do the same and to look into the bible to confirm all we have been taught. Let's look careful in the writings of Luke and see how his findings are affirmed by other writers in the bible.

## Tuesday, Aug. 15: Read Psalms 102-103, Luke 2

The Psalmist writes "Let this be written for a future generation." It is good to know that at times we may feel as he did but God remains unchanged. God's loving kindness is everlasting and his promises to generations. "The children of your servants will live in your presence; their descendants will be established before you."

Luke continues to declare that Jesus' life was from the beginning divine. He simply wasn't just a "good man" on whom the Spirit of God rested. He had divine origins.

## Wednesday Aug. 16: Read <u>Psalms 104-105</u>, <u>Luke 3</u>

Psalm 104: When the Psalmist looks at creation and recognizes that God has brought all of this after judgment of the flood so we, according to John 5:24 can look with awe and know that sin has been judged on our behalf and say as the Psalmist does "Praise the Lord, my soul."

In Luke 3, Jesus' genealogy is well recorded. It was not obvious so many did not believe He was the messiah. God cautions us to look closely and not rush to judgment. There is so much more He has to teach us if we will spend time with Him in reading His word. He welcomes the difficult questions.

## Thursday, Aug. 17: Read Psalms 106-107, Luke 4.

Todays readings for Psalms echo one another that *His love endures forever*. In Psalm 107 it speaks of sailors who go on the mighty seas and witness first hand the power of the water. They would be fools to believe they are a match for this great power. It must be God's grace that brings them safely to harbor. In like manner, we would be simple to believe that His Love does not endure forever toward us. Sometimes we need to leave the small lives we live to see the vastness of His creation and how majestic He is.

Luke 4 revisits the issue of temptation that was first introduced in the Garden of Eden (Gen. 3). However, this time the setting is a bit different. With Christ, the environment was anything but a beautiful garden, and yet Christ did not sin. We can learn a lot from Christ's handling of temptation. Knowing God's word is essential if temptation is to be defeated.
